Kommersant

1. Anna Balashova article headlined "Megafon mobilizes totally" says that the mobile phone operator Megafon is going to buy LTE-operator Scartel for \$1.18 billion; pp 1, 7 (600 words).
2. Dmitry Butrin et al. report headlined "Police ask for city increment" says that Interior Ministry has drafted amendments to the law on police to return subsidy-free regions and municipalities the right to make their own additional payments to police staff; pp 1, 2 (500 words).
3. Ksenia Dementyeva et al. article headlined "Svyaznoy for Onexsim" says that Mikhail Prokhorov's Onexsim group is negotiating the purchase of 50 percent of shares of the mobile retailer Svyaznoy; pp 1, 8 (600 words).

4. Yelena Kiseleva article headlined "For sake of platinum" says that consortium consisting of Vitaly Mashchitskiy's Vi Holding, the state-run corporation Rostec and Vneshekonombank are closing a deal to purchase 40 percent of shares in the Russian-Zimbabwean joint venture Ruschrome Mining to develop the world's second biggest platinum deposit; pp 1, 9 (800 words).

5. Dmitry Butrin article headlined "Let it be gun, if not 1,000Bln" looks at yet another attempt by the Far East Development Ministry to expand its powers, namely to obtain powers to coordinate the activities of federal ministries and law-enforcement bodies in the region; p 2 (600 words).

6. Taisia Bekbulatova article headlined "Sergei Sobyenin to rely on Civil Platform" says that Civil Platform's leader Mikhail Prokhorov has accepted the acting Moscow mayor's proposal to nominate their candidate for Moscow business ombudsman. Experts regard Sobyenin's move as an attempt to counter mayoral opposition candidate Alexei Navalny's 'social contract' with internet entrepreneurs; p 3 (400 words).

7. Vyacheslav Kozlov and Diana Munasipova article headlined "Fines raised for labour migrants" says that amendments to migration legislature toughening sanctions for illegal migrants enter into force today; p 3 (300 words).

8. Sergei Strokan et al. report headlined "2+2 to work for two" mentions U.S. President Barack Obama's decision to cancel the September meeting with President Vladimir Putin, quotes sources "close" to the Kremlin and the U.S. Department of State and says that today's meeting of the U.S. and Russian defense and foreign ministers has a challenging task of preventing further deterioration of relations; p 5 (600 words).

9. Olga Kuznetsova et al. report headlined "Egypt seeking new mediators" says that Moscow has already established contacts with Egypt's new leadership and may step in as the USA and the EU have failed to help solve the Egyptian crisis; p 5 (400 words).

10. Ivan Safronov and Anna Balashova interview headlined "Defense Ministry remains our main client" with the new head of the Voentelekom company, Alexander Davydov, speaking about the company's strategy; p 10 (1,700 words).

Moscow is not going to agree to the proposal, though; pp 1, 7 (1,000 words).
3. Darya Garmonenko and Alexei Gorbachev article headlined "Fight not for chair but for percentage" says Moscow mayoral candidates are planning to spend 30 million rubles (about \$900,000) on average on their campaigns and looks at their tactics; pp 1-2 (700 words).
4. Igor Naumov article headlined "Reduction demanded from Nabiullina" wonders if the Central Bank head Elvira Nabiullina is planning to softening monetary policy; pp 1, 4 (600 words).
5. Editorial headlined "Business returning to politics" says that a "social contract" between Moscow mayoral hopeful Alexei Navalny and internet entrepreneurs is a breakthrough, but the risk is that the entrepreneurs cannot really control Navalny; p 2 (400 words).
6. Darya Tsiryulik article headlined "Military in Egypt running out of patience" quotes a Russian expert as saying that Egypt is facing a civil war; p 2 (600 words).
