Expat favorite Correa's was opened in 2003 by American Isaac Correa. Since then, the chain

has grown to eight branches across Moscow, with an emphasis on healthy, fresh and simply prepared food. While it serves up great salads and pizzas, Correa's is perhaps best loved for its continental buffet brunch (around 1,300 rubles, depending on the branch). The staff don't mind if you come with a group of friends to graze for several hours — which is handy as the mammoth tables of flaky pastries, yoghurts and fresh bread will require some serious attention. The interior is light, airy and has a Scandinavian minimalism to its decor.

A great place if you're feeling fancy.

Dine on perfectly cooked pastries, cold cuts, mountains of caviar and champagne as you soak up the ambience. While it's one of the priciest brunch options in Moscow, the Metropol certainly brings a whole new meaning to the saying: "Breakfast like a king, lunch like a prince, and dine like a peasant."

While many will be familiar with Haggis as an evening hangout spot serving great craft beer in an upmarket pub interior, the place also offers hearty food all day long. Dishes on the breakfast menu all cost under 500 rubles. Highlights include rye toast with smoked haddock, English muffin with salmon, and black pudding with pork tongue, topped with a poached egg. While the menu does tend to be meat-oriented, there's also plenty for vegetarians to enjoy, like the cauliflower omelet with truffle oil and the wholesome barley porridge. Its central location makes Haggis the perfect pit stop before a walk around the most attractive streets in the city.
