

Ice Maze With No Escape Branded a Metaphor for Russia

An ice maze with no entrance or exit has led online users to designate the unfinished structure a metaphor for the hardships that many Russians face.

Photographs and videos <u>appeared</u> online over the weekend showing children climbing over walls to play inside an ice labyrinth on the Far East island of Sakhalin. Officials <u>told</u> local media the maze will be finished by Dec. 29.

Online users saw the maze as representative of life in today's Russia.

"It's a labyrinth and an enclosure in one," read one tweet. "It is a representation of the Russian state."

Another Twitter user <u>described</u> the children as "preparing for life in the motherland." That description echoed the <u>most common response</u>.

"You either have to break the rules by climbing walls or accept your parents' help if you want to achieve anything," the commenter <u>wrote</u>.
