

Ukrainian Rocket Attack on Belgorod Kills 2 After Drone Strikes Knock Out Power

At least two people were killed in a Ukrainian rocket attack on the southwestern Belgorod region on Monday afternoon after thousands of residents were left without power due to an earlier drone barrage.

Belgorod region Governor Vyacheslav Gladkov <u>said</u> one of the people killed was a worker who was helping to restore power to homes in the region. He did not say where and when the attack happened, though unconfirmed <u>reports</u> from Telegram news channels suggested an electric station in the city of Belgorod was targeted in the rocket attack.

Gladkov <u>said</u> the second person, a man, died at the hospital as a result of injuries sustained in the strike.

Earlier, the governor said that around 40,000 residents in the Belgorod region were initially

<u>left without power</u> following Ukrainian drone attacks on local energy infrastructure. As of Monday morning, at least 5,400 residents were still without power.

Russia's Defense Ministry <u>said</u> on Monday that its air defense systems destroyed 251 Ukrainian drones overnight, marking one of Ukraine's largest retaliatory attacks on Russia this year.

In the western Bryansk region, where its governor had <u>warned</u> residents twice about incoming drone strikes, emergency authorities <u>told</u> local media that energy infrastructure was damaged due to three "man-made fires."

The Telegram news channel Astra <u>said</u> it identified one of the locations of a Ukrainian drone strike in the Bryansk region as the Klintsy power station. Bryansk region Governor Alexander Bogomaz <u>said</u> eight Ukrainian drones had been intercepted overnight, causing no injuries but triggering responses from emergency crews.

Astra, citing eyewitness videos, also <u>reported</u> that Ukrainian drones may have targeted an explosives factory in the Nizhny Novgorod region town of Dzerzhinsk, east of Moscow. Governor Gleb Nikitin<u>said</u> 20 drones had targeted the town's "industrial zone," causing at least one injury, damage and fires in residential areas.

Meanwhile, mass overnight drone strikes were <u>reported</u> across annexed Crimea. A pro-Ukrainian Telegram channel <u>claimed</u> a major fire erupted at an oil loading terminal in the coastal town of Feodosia.

The Moscow Times could not immediately verify the reports.

Russia's Defense Ministry said almost half of the 251 Ukrainian drones destroyed between Sunday night and Monday morning had been downed over Crimea, the Black Sea and the Sea of Azov. Dozens of others were shot out of the skies over the Kursk and Belgorod regions, it added.

Eight airports across southern and central Russia introduced flight restrictions on Sunday evening. Most had resumed operations by the following morning.

Moscow Mayor Sergei Sobyanin reported that one drone was shot down while approaching the Russian capital before dawn.
